Artist Ray Smith, who was also a teacher, asked his students to draw a facial feature of a model and to pass on the paper to their neighbour, who then drew a different feature and passed it on, making a face drawn in different styles from different perspectives by different people. He recreated the students' work on a large canvas to make the central artwork above (Secondary Revision.)
